LIRE ENYEDY, Dryngel played midfield in school. Both figure to be defensive specialists with the Rockers. Both also tink they have what it takes to make it.

"I feel str.nger indoor (than outdoor)," said Dryngel. "I like the pace better outdoor, but I'm more confident indoor towards my defense. In indoor, everything changes so

fast."

Enyedy agreed. "Indoor is a much faster game. It's a lot different. You're so much more involved, you're constantly being called upon."

Things could change faster If both survive the next tryout, scheduled for September. The Rockers' season opens in November.

The uncertainty doesn't bother Dzyngel. "If you can do what you love, and get paid for it, I think that's great," he said.

The Rockers will also be looking at local goalkeepers at a later date. Fifteen showed up at the last tryout, far too many to rate accurately. Among the leading keeper candidates to make it to the Rockers are Britan O'Shea and Chris Moore, both of Livonia and former Schoeleraft players.

Tinnion would like to establish a taxi squad-type setup, keeping several local players on a reserve basis in case of injuries to starters.


