Inlets and cuttest from the pond were checked for oil as well. He attributes the abundant growth oil age to the chemicals used on lawns surrounding the pond.

The pond runs as far south as Eight Mile and Middtbeelt and as far north as Nine Mile and Lahser. It eventually runs into the Rouge Rive-er, he said.
Bass and pan fish are native to the pond as well as heron, ducks, geese, muskrats and raccoons.
