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Algae killed fish

Inlets and outlets from the pond were checked for oil as well. He attributes the abundant growth of algae to the chemicals used on lawns surrounding the pond.

Residents could help ease the problem by not mowing their lawns all the way to the edge of the pond. That would help stop chemicals from running into it.

He expects the abundance of algae to kill fish and aquatic insects, but says other wildlife should not be affected.

"When the oxygen in the water is lowered, fish die first," Friese said. "Everything competes for oxygen in the water."
The pond runs as far south as Eight Mile and Middlebelt and as far north as Nine Mile and Lahser. It eventually runs into the Rouge River, he said.

Base and pan fish are native to the pond as well as heron, ducks, geese, muskrats and raccoons.

Area residents said they will bring up the concern at the next subdivision board meeting. "It will definitely be brought up," said Sylvia Lukaszewicz, whose property borders the pond. "We don't want any more dead fish."

Applications for deferment of 1990 taxes will be available at the City of Farmington Treasurer's Office. If your income for 1989 did not exceed \$20,000 and you are a paraplegic, quadriplegic, senior citizen, eligible serviceman, eligible widow, blind, or totally or permanently disabled, your application must be filed with the City of Farmington Treasurer's Office no later than September 14, 1990. Summer taxes that are deferred may be paid without penalty until February 28, 1991.

By law, if the last day for payment falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday, the day is extended to include the next day which is not a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN of the intention of the City of Farmington Hills, a municipal corporation, to authorize and issue the following described bonds of the City of Farmington Hills:

Such bonds are to be issued by the City of Farmington Hills for the following purposes:

ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

Such bonds will bear interest at a rate not exceeding 12% per annum to be determined at the time of the sale of said bonds.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that said bonds will be issued under and pursuant to the provisions of the Charter of the City of Farmington Hills, Act No. 279 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1909, as amended, and Act No. 202 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1943, as amended, and that the principal thereof and the interest thereon are payable from installments of special assessments in anticipation of which they have been issued. In the instance such special assessments are not sufficient to pay the interest on such bonds, the City will advance from its general funds sufficient money to pay such principal and interest. The City's ability to raise such funds is subject to applicable constitutional, statutory and charter limitations on the taxing power of the City.

NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that this notice is given by order of the Council of the City of Farmington Hills, Michigan, and for the benefit of the electors of the City, in order to inform them that resolutions authorizing the issuance of said bonds will be adopted by the Council of the City of Farmington Hills and that said bonds will be issued without submitting the question of their issuance to the vote of the electors of the City, unless within 45 days from the publication of this notice, a petition signed by not less than 10% or 15,000, whichever is lesser, of the registered electors of the City, requesting a referendum upon the question of the issuance of such bonds is filed with the City Clerk, in which event the bonds will not be issued unless and until approved by a majority of the electors of the City qualified to vote and voting thereon at a general or special election.

TO ALL INTERESTED AGENCIES, GROUPS, AND PERSONS:

On or about the above named City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, will request the U.S. Dept. of Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (PL 93-383) for the following project:

Grand River/Middlebelt Sidewalk Improvement which includes the removal of damaged sidewalks and the installation of replacement sidewalks along Grand River between Eight Mile and Tuck Road and on Middlebelt between Eight Mile and Shilawasee (\$45,000) located in Farmington Hills, Oakland Co., MI.

An Environmental Review Record respecting the within project has been made by the above-named Farmington Hills, Oakland County, which documents the environmental review of the project. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying, upon request.

The City of Farmington Hills will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Farmington Hills is certifying to HUD that Farmington Hills and William M. Costick in his official capacity as City Manager, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental review decision making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, Farmington Hills may use the Block Grant funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases:

(a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the chief executive officer or other officer of applicant approved by HUD or (b) that applicant's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedures (24 CFR Part 59) and may be addressed to HUD, P.O. McNamara Federal Bldg. 477 Michigan Ave., Detroit, MI 48226.

Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD. No objection received after July 17, 1990 will be considered by HUD.
