Program helps those who lost a child

"Resolve Through Sharing" program for parents who have suffered the loss of a child will be in Detroit First Church of the Nazarene.

"Resolve Through Sharing" is a comprehensive perinatal bereavement program for families experiencing miscarriage, still birth, newborn death or the death of any child, regardless of age.

The program is designed to ensure that consistent, sensitive care is given to each and every grieving parent and family from the moment the child dies throughout the period of grieving.

The "Resolve Through Sharing" program will begin Tuesday, Oct. 2, and run for four consecutive Tuesdays. There is a \$20 fee for materials. The church is at 21260 Haggerty,

The series of classes will be presented by Sharon Philat and Valerie Anibal, both certified "Resolve Through Sharing" instructors.

The classes begin with a program titled "Grief and the Process," which helps participants work through the grieving process. "Anger and Forgiveness" is the title of the second program. The series continues with

"Relationships." The final program, "The Healing Process," deals with a broken heart and the steps to recovery.

Congregation erects an historical marker

On Sunday, Oct. 7 Nardin Park United Methodist Church will dedicate an official State of Michigan Historical Marker after the 11 a.m. church service. The marker pays tribute to the long history of Nardin Park Church in the Detroit area. It was organized in 1927 from the merger of the Ninde Church, established

in 1888, and the Grand River Avenue Church, established in 1891.

Located for many years on West Chicago Boulevard in Detroit, the congregation moved to Farmington Hills and dedicated the present church Oct. 17, 1965, 25 years ago.

The historic marker is being erected as a memorial to Barbara

Lutz McConnell, a lifelong member of the church. Participating in the marker dedication ceremony are

Jerry D. Roe, a member of the Michigan Historical Commission; Dr. William A. Ritter, Nardin Park's Senior Minister; Rev. Michael Seymour, the District Superintendent of the Methodist Church; and James Hildebrand,

chairman of the Nardin Park Board of Trustees.

A reception will be served on the front lawn by members of the "Back 40" fellowship group after the service.

The church is at 29887 11 Mile Road, a short distance west of Middlebelt Road.

"I'm not one for joining clubs. The only club I belong to is the (Farmington-Farmington Hills) Chamber of Commerce."

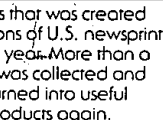
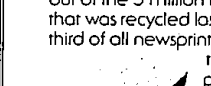
