

Raiders end mix at Farmington meet

Farmington High appears to be peaking at the right time in girls cross country, and Tuesday the Falcons proved that by winning the Farmington City Meet in convincing style.

Placing five girls among the top seven runners, Farmington ran away from North Farmington and Farmington Hills Harrison with a first-place total of 23 points. North came in second with 30 followed by Harrison in a distant third at 72.

"We've been struggling in dual meets all year," Farmington coach John Barrett said. "Before this year we hadn't lost a dual meet in three years, so it's been a downer year for us. But we made a good comeback and would like to finish strong. We're looking forward to the end of the year for a good finish."

Leading Farmington were Jennifer Derwinski and Allison Davis, who finished in second and third place respectively. Derwinski finished the Oakland Community College course in 21:18, followed by Davis at 21:28. Cheryl Casoroli was fifth for the Falcons at 22:10, followed in seventh by Anna Ureag (22:21) and Gretchen Gretchen

Clapsson (22:24). North Farmington was paced by Tracy Mitchell, who won the individual title (21:17), and Jenny Weh, who came in fourth place (21:49). Head coach Bill Pinnell has called heavily on the pair, which usually finishes one-two for the Raiders.

MITCHELL, A senior, took last fall off but Pinnell is glad she has returned to the Raiders lineup. "Tracy didn't run last year because she was concentrating on track (in the spring)," Pinnell said. "So I told her, if you would have had a better track season, she's running with a little fire in her eyes. She looked relaxed in the two-mile mark and really took off in the last mile. She's kind of hungry and knows what she has to do."
