her, but they couldn't beat her," he said.

"The only difference between her and the top-ranked boys is their serve. They can get more power on the serve. Otherwise, she hits as hard as they do baseline to baseline."

Davidson is being recruited by many of the nation's collegiate tennis powers and has narrowed her choices to UCLA, USC, Georgia, Kansas and Arizona State.

People she meets can't understand why she doesn't want to attend a prestigious school like the University of Michigan, according to Davidson.

"THEY DON'T realize I can't wait to get out of the cold weather," she said.

Davidson's game has improved so much in the last year she's thinking more seriously about a possible pro career at some time, too.

"I've been playing well and have competed against some of the top people and beaten them," she said. "I want to go to college for a year or two, and if I feel I'm ready for it, I'd love to play professionally."

Davidson also has a fresh outlook on the game and her future in it.

"Only recently have I begun to enjoy the practicing," she said. "I took four months off last year and was wasting. The time off made me realize how much I missed it."

The Hawks, ranked No. 3 in Class B most of the year, finished fifth for the second consecutive year.

Kingswood repeated as state champ with 25 points. Sturgis (21),



Battle Creek Lakeview (0), East Grand Rapids (19) and Brighton (18) rounded out the top five.

"I THOUGHT we could have done better, but fifth in the state is pretty good," Goldstein said. "There was more balance this year. We scored three more points than we did last year and finished in the same place. There was more balance this year, because Kingswood was a little weaker."

Warriors edge Falcons

When the crunch is on it's "Miller Time" for Walled Lake Western's girls basketball team.

Holding a slim three-point lead late in the game Tuesday over scrappy Farmington, Western senior point guard Holly Miller took control of the game and led her team to a thrilling 53-51 victory on "Parents Night" at Western.

"In crunch time when they made a run Holly took over for us," said Western coach Don Peterson, whose team improved to 8-8 overall and 5-5 in the Western Lakes Activities Association. "She made a couple big baskets and beat their press by herself. She always plays an outstanding game for us."

Miller scored eight of her 19 points and dished off three of her set assists in the fourth quarter to lift Western to the win.

THE WARRIORS took their biggest lead in the game, 46-38, after Miller hit a triple with 5:08 remaining in the contest.

But the Falcons refused to roll over, and made a game of it when senior Shelli Gaul (20 points, 12 rebounds) scored both ends of a two-shot foul, then followed with an inside basket moments later.

Miller sandwiched two jump shots around a pair of free throws to bring Farmington's Kerri Owczarzak to top Western back on top by five, 50-45.

But again, the Falcons clawed their way back. Becky Washbrook cannot a pair of free throws and Gaul scored two more from the charity stripe as Farmington pulled to within a point, 50-49 with 1:15 remaining on the clock.

CHRISTA CARR took a pass from Miller on Western next possession and hit a short jumper to give the Warriors a decisive 52-49 lead.

Farmington had a chance to take the lead moments later when Owczarzak (11 points) seven rebounds) drove the lane for a layup and drew the foul. Her free throw bounced off the rim, but Farmington retained possession as Western lost the loose ball out of bounds.

Western's Jenny Gross stole the inbound pass with 22 remaining in the game to preserve the win for Western.

Miller split a pair of free throws with 1:17 left to provide the final margin of victory, then grabbed a defensive rebound off an errant Farmington free throw and dribbled the final seconds off the clock.

FOUL TROUBLE plagued both teams as Farmington finished the game with one starter on the bench and Western finished with two starters out.

Farmington converted 19-of-33 free throws while Western converted 20-of-34.

"I was very pleased with our effort," said Farmington coach Diana Fair, whose team slipped to 2-14 overall and 1-8 in the WLA, "but disappointed with all the fouls. If we hadn't put them on the line so much maybe the outcome would have been different."

The Falcons hurt themselves with fouls in the second quarter as Western converted 11-of-15 attempts, but finished the quarter without a field goal.

Owczarzak scored five points in the quarter for the Falcons and teammate Tammy Allen scored four

of her seven as the half ended with the score tied at 23-23.

DAWN GODFREY opened the third with a basket for the Warriors. Farmington's Kerri Finlayson evened the game at 25-25 with a jumper from the corner, but Miller put the Warriors ahead for good with a layup with 8:39 remaining in the third.

Godfrey scored eight of her game-high 22 points in the third as the quarter ended with Western leading 37-33.

"It's always nice to get a win," Peterson said. "In the first half they outlasted us. They got to every loose ball and every long rebound. I give Farmington a lot of credit and commend them for a great effort. They played a very aggressive, physical game."

Western travels to Livonia Franklin today for a key Western Division game.

"That one will be a tough one," admitted Peterson. "Franklin is one of the better teams in the area and one of the better teams in the state. We're going to give it our best shot."

Mercy tops Divine Child

Farmington Hills Mercy's third-quarter outburst supplied the Marlins with a 20-point cushion entering the final quarter Tuesday, leading to a 56-42 victory at Dearborn Divine Child.

Laure DeMatteis' 19 points fueled the Mercy attack, which outscored the Falcons 17-4 in the third quarter. Carrie Watson added 12. Divine Child got 12 points from Rhonda McAllester.

The win boosted Mercy's record to 12-4 overall, 5-3 in the Catholic League's Central Division. Divine Child slipped to 9-8 and 6-10 overall.

N. FARMINGTON 44, CHURCHILL 44: Eve Clair again provided the offense for North Farmington, claiming four three-pointers en route to a 25-point performance Tuesday at Livonia Churchill.

North, 6-9 overall, 3-7 in the WLA, trailed the Chargers 25-23 at the half but, with Churchill's defensive efforts aimed at containing Clair, others stepped forward and hit key shots. Dana Botwick got seven fourth-quarter points, and Karen Serenetti scored four of her eight points in the second half.

Christy Daly's 16 points was best for Churchill (7-8 overall, 4-8 in the WLA); Christina Garry notched 15.

STEVENSON 50, HARRISON 32: Livonia Stevenson limited the Hawks to eight first-half points, a big reason why the visiting Spartans were able to run their record to 10-5 overall, 7-3 in the WLA Tuesday.

Stevenson had a 28-8 lead at the half and was never threatened.

All nine Spartans scored, for the first time this season. Karen Groulx led the assault with 11 points; Laura Zaitsev had 10 and Kelly Cotter eight.

Katie McAkin's 13 points — nine coming in the fourth quarter — paced Harrison, which slipped to 1-13 overall, 1-9 in the WLA. Heather Hopkins added nine.

HARPER WOODS 39, CLARENCEVILLE 35: A poor scoring first half doomed Livonia Clarenceville to defeat in its Metro Conference meeting with Harper Woods Tuesday at Clarenceville.

The Trojans (2-9 in the Metro, 2-11 overall) trailed 11-4 after one quarter and 18-9 at the half. They outscored Harper Woods — which defeated them 43-16 earlier this season — 26-21 in the second half, but couldn't catch up.

Rhonda Saunders triggered the Trojan attack with 16 points. Leandra Hoffman clipped in with nine. Kelly Pitta had 11 points for Harper Woods (7-3 in the Metro, 8-7 overall).

Minutes of the previous meeting of October 1, 1990, were approved as corrected. City State Representative Karen Peterson reported to City Council.

Minutes of other Boards were received and/or filed.

Council granted a six month sign variance for 24155 Drake Road, and the requested sign variance for 32411 Grand River.

Council supported resolutions from Oak Park and Southfield relative to the Michigan Solid Waste Grants Program.

Council issued a proclamation designating October 18, 1990 as BEAUTIFICATION RECOGNITION DAY.

Council agreed to the cost participation agreement between the Oakland County Board of Road Commissioners and the City of Farmington Hills, and approved a contract for the improvement of Orchard Lake Road.
