Autopsy: elderly woman fell, drowned

A 74-year-old Florida woman who walked away from her relatives' Flatingston Hills home Monday morning and was found nearly 12 hours later in nearby Pebble Creek died from drowning, according to the Oakland County Medical Exam-ing.

Eda Perrault of Sebring, Fia., also suffered hypothermia dementia (di-sorientation and exposure to the cold), a spokesman for the medical examiner's office said.

"There was evidence she had fall-

"There was evidence she had fallen...she cut berself...and there was a loss of blood, which probably added to the disorientation," said Sgt. Charles Nebus of the Farmington Hills detective bureau.

Perrault was found at 2:14 p.m.
Monday by a Farmington Hills firefighter not far from her niece's
house on Millbrook, east of Middlebelt, between 12 and 13 Mile roads.
She had walked away from the house

at about 3:30 a.m., according to po-lice reports.

Police and firefighters searched for the elderly woman throughout the night. At daylight, the Detroit Police Department's belicopter and crew joined the search, Nebus said.

Perrault's relatives had just frought her to Farmingion Hills from her home in Sebring. When Perrault walked lato her niece's house she said she was in the wrong house and walked into her niece's house she said she was in the front porch, according to police.
