Adkins, 54, came to the Detroit area from her home in Portland, Oregon, specifically to use the suicide machine.

DR. JACOB CHASON of the Bloomfleid area said he did not see Adkins when she was alive, but was hired by the medical examiner's off-ice as a consultant to examine her brain

brain.
Her case was extremely advanced, Chason testified. In the thousands of Alzheimer's victims be had seen, only one or two were as severely ravaged by the disease, he said.

Other witnesses gave the packed courtroom a glimpse of the hours be-fore and after Adkins activated the suicide machine.

Michael Podeszwik, an investiga-tor for the medical examiner's off-ice, testified that he was summoned to Groveland Oaks County Park near Holly about 3 p.m. on June 4 where

he met Kevorkian, dressed casually in clothes splattered with blood. Kevorkian was pollte and cooperative, Podeszwik said, and apologized for the blood stains as he was wiping them off with tissue. Podeszwik said he took numerous pictures of Adkins' body and the scene.

Verbal sparks between the defense

Verbal sparks between the defense and the prosecution conlined to fly during the preliminary examination of the controversial suicide doctor accused of murder. Lawyers on both sides in the daylong examination of Dr. Jack Kevorkian raised frequent objections and often raised their voices to interupt each other, although they were never admonished by District Judge Gerald E. McNally who was to continue proceedings today in Clarkston. On numerous occassions defense attorney Geoffrey Fleger and Oak-

land County assistant prosecutor Michael Modelski gave mocking or sar-eastie answers to each other.

They argued the merits of first degree murder charges against Kevorkian, 62, of Boyal Oak who admits helping Janet Adkins of Portland end her life with his invention last June

VERBAL SPARKS are normal in court proceedings. But Wednesday's were preceded by separate press conferences at which each side in-sulted the other, and leveled accusa-tions of professional misconduct.

Kevorkian's attorneys, Fieger and Michael Schwartz, accused Oakland

County Prosecutor Richard Thompson of being overrealous.

They even claimed Thompson may have ignored a memo written by a former assistant prosecutor that advised Keverklan that assisting in a suicide is not a crime in Michigan.

The defense attorneys suggested that advice may have been a factor in the Royal Oak physician's decision ouse his suicide machine for the first time in Michigan. "The prosecution of Jack Kevorkian." Is the act of a rogue prosecutor, Schwartz alleged.

"In his obsession to bring Dr.

Kevorkian to a point where he will be placed in jail for the rest of his life. Mr. Thompson has engaged in acts that can only be described as despicable acts of misconduct which I believe constitute gross professional misconduct and which should cause the prosecution to be dismissed, "Schwartz said.

AT IIIS PRESS conference Tuesday, Thompson accused Fieger of lying and playing "loose" with the facts.

Thompson said Kevorkian never claimed he was told by the prosecutor's office that assisting a suicide is legal.
