Farmington Hills

Board has several options for altering boundaries

Following are details of a boundary study report for middle school and high schools in Farmington, as shared with the school board and community on Dec. 18.

The middle school subcommittee came to no concessus about boundaries, but offered three proposals to

change. Section numbers in the re-port refer to the layout of old Farm-ington Township:

• The preferred high school plan is to retain current boundary lines and open enrollment, allowing stu-dents to attend a high school our of their district, but providing their

own transportation. Enrollment would be capped at: 1,100 for Farmington High, 975 for Harrison High and 1075 for North Farmington.

A second high school plan, though not preferred, would leave current boundaries in place and do away with open enrollment.

• Plan I for the middle schools would move students from Section 5 from Dunckel to Warner, move Flanders Elementary district and Sections 21-2, 21-4 and 22 from Dunckel to East; and move sections 19-1, 19-2, 20-1, 20-2 and 21-1 from Power to Dunckel. This plan would move between 211 and 315 students, depending on whether eighth graders were included.

wouldmove Section 5 from Dunckel to Warner; sections 19, 20, 21-1 and 21-3 from Power to Dunckel; and Sections 22, 21-2, 21-4, 16-4, 15-3 and 15-4 from Dunckel to East. This plan wold move between 180 and 257 stu-dents.
