AGROUP of Harrison High School students has re-turned to another time, another place, as part of their humanities studies. Laura Sparrow's class recreated designs from brass mybings of the Middle Ages – one of the many hands-on projects being done in the three Farm-ington public high schools as part of the district's re-vamped humanities program.

Students work on a number of class projects related to their period of study, take architectural field trips and prepare food feast forom various time periods. Using replicas of brass originals from the Middle Ages, Harrison students designed a variety of works. The use of brass rubbings is a European craft which has been practiced for at least 300 years, and since World War II has gained popularity as a hobby.

Man dies from accident complications An 81-year-old resident of Detroit Baptist Manor died Christmas Eve right of complications from a traffic accident which occurred six days earlier.
