Under state and federal laws, the tanks must be removed or permanently closed using a stringent set of guidelines and any contaminated soil around the tanks removed and replaced. "HE AND IIIS family are very much in shock about the whole thing, but I think he'il do all right," said his attorney, Jonathon Maire. "He has some (spiritual) resources that will help him."

Among the damaging allegations that have come to light is that Yanke spent the stolen cash paying for sex yith prostitucture. Yanke was carrying the number of the Star Lite escort scrvice when he was atrested, sources said. A man who answered the Star Lite phone services ald he knew Yanke, and the pastor was on the service's "do not send" list, meaning the service would not send women to meet him if he called.

if he called. Yanke created problems at another service two years ago when he would set up meetings then canceled them when an escort arrived, said the man, who would, give only the name Rick.

"I think he was trying to see girls around the service," Rick said. Star Life charges \$150 an hour for escorts, he said.

ACCORDING TO POLICE, Yanke used disguises such as hair dyes, fake scars, and glasses when robbing banks and usually passed notes to teller's announcing the holdups.

The FBI had dubbed the robber 'the bearded bandit.' Yanke has red hair and a red beard. The man who robbed the Bloomfeld Township bank had a black beard and wore a hat and glasses. Investigators reportedly found makeup in the church after Yanke's arrest.
