we would suggest that the pro-eeds from the real estate be invest-d in high quality bonds because she has no bonds in her portfolio current. This will help balance her port-olio while bringing in needed in-rane.

we think that stocks are an appropriate part of her total portfolio since their growth over the long term can help negate the long-term effects of inflation. But the stocks were accumulated at a time when she and her husband did not expect to need much supplemental investment income. Many of the stock holdings, including some of those in

the IRA, have a very low dividend payout. We believe these low-yielding stocks should be replaced with stocks that have a steady, significant dividend. Mature large companies and utilities are examples of the types of stocks that would be likely replacements.
