FARMINGTON "Family Life and Human Relations Education" is the title of a course which will include sex education if accepted by the Farmington school board and the community.

Lawrence Freedman, Wood Creek Elementary principal and program coordinator for the Family Life Education Committee on human sexuality that prepared the course prospectus, explained that the name is an accurate reflection of its content.

"Sex education is only a

part of the larger subject," Freedman stated. "Our main emphasis in the entire program, from kindergarten through senior high is to help youngsters to a better understanding of themselves and other human beings, to realize the value of human life, the family, and their life as they contribute to the family structure."

"The phase dealing with human development helps children to accept and understand in a positive way changes that take place in the

human body as it grows," he continued.

"The program has been written with full understanding of its importance to every child and family. Because of this, a great deal of professional knowledge was applied in its development."

DESPITE THIS, the program has been designed around "growing up" source material already available to the district which means that it can be implemented with a very nominal expenditure for in-service training of teachers.

Freedman's committee has prepared two comprehensive booklets explaining the course procedures step by step and grade by grade. These are available to the community at the school administration building.

Working with him on the committee which has been active for more than a year were Wallace Price, elementary principal; Frances Copp, kindergarten teacher; Mrs. Marleah Thompson, fourth grade; Mrs. Ellen Rich, grade six; Douglas Cooper, biology teacher; Mrs. Mary Wathen, home economics; and Mrs. Mary Jane Colbeck, high school sociology.

Chamber OKs Civic Brochure

FARMINGTON The Farmington Chamber of Commerce has approved an informative brochure to promote the Farmington Area, announced chamber president John Anhut.

The brochure, to be printed by Tri-State Publications of Livonia, also has the support of the City of Farmington and Farmington Township. The booklet will cover every facet of the Farmington community, including history, educational facilities, industry, commerce, recreation, population, churches, hospitals, cultural and economic factors says Dale Welling of Tri-State.

"This book will tell the whole story of the Farmington community," added Anhut, "and provide a most useful sales tool which the chamber can use in attracting new industry, businesses, professional and technical people here."

A saving to nine Oakland County school districts was announced this week by Dr. Floyd Smith, director of transportation for Oakland Schools.

It was a \$31 cut in the cost of school bus bodies from last year. The 39 sixty-six passenger and one 36 passenger bus to be ordered by the districts include driver safety features not specified last year.
