## 'Guns of Paradise' star a live wire off-screen

### Jenny Beck far different from her serious character

Jenny Beck, who stars as the young teen responsible for looking after her three younger brothers on CBS' **Guns of Paradise**, lives in a different time and pursues a much different lifestyle than her character.

Beck is an original cast member on the show, which is now in its third season and airs Fridays. The actress is much more mobile and carefree than her character, Claire Carroll, a 16-year-old who has been helping her uncle take care of her brothers since their mother died three years earlier. In fact, the actress said, if she were placed in the same situation as her character, she's not sure she could do it.

"What she's doing in the 1890s, it was difficult enough. If she needs to go to the market she hops on a horse, right? My character was 13 when this happened, and I would not have been able to take care of the kids as well up the 1990s," she said. "Back then it was so much simpler."

But that's not to say the 16-year-old is any less responsible. In fact, she

received the American Youth Foundation Award in December for commitment to service work. Through the nation's daughter, Assistance League of Beck does, however, live a much more carefree life than her character.

"I've always thought of my character as times that come along," Beck said, adding that her main commitment's service work is done at that time. "We don't have things that are as 'up the wall' for and they have a big sleep on the night before at somebody's house. I love to be a lot of fun."

Like most teens, Beck's shopping is another passion, but Beck.

"Whenever I go shopping, I don't go for anything," she said. "I go and I see something that I love. I love. And then I come home and I gotta have to find something to wear it with or find something to wear it for," she said.

In her spare time, Beck rides her quarterhorse named Braces. She's even given the other kids in the cast riding lessons on the side.

"None of the other kids had a father when the show started. I've had them over once or twice and we've been riding together," she said.
