One of every 50 babies born in Detroit dies before the infant's first birthday. Poor nutrition, lack of education and prenatal care, teen pregnancy and drug dependency all contribute to this tragedy that doesn't have to happen.

The Michigan Catholic Health Systems Infant Mortality Project offers volunteers an opportunity to help make a change in these young lives with two programs: "Parent-Infant Partners" and "Read Write Now."

Both programs offer free training sessions beginning with an orientation class at 6 p.m. Tuesday, March 5, and continuing for eight consecutive Tuesdays in Cafeteria Confer-

ence Room A, Providence Hospital, 16001 West Nine Mile Road, Southfield.

Volunteers who wish to participate in the Parent-Infant Partners program will receive 24 hours of training to become a friend and a resource to expectant parents, providing information and guidance from pregnancy and delivery through the baby's first year.

The Read Write Now program offers individualized training to volunteers who are asked to commit one hour a week to help individuals learn to read.
