Big competition for Big East title

College basketball's premier conference will be on display March 9 and 10 when CBS Sports covers both Big East Tournament semifinal games.

Five Big East teams, Georgetown, Pittsburgh, Connecticut, Syracuse and St. John's have been ranked in the nation's top 20 at some point in the season and have a legitimate shot at the automatic berth in the NCAA Tournament.

John Thompson's Georgetown Hoyas led by Alonzo Mourning and Dikembe Mutombo have the defense and offensive balance to make a run at the national championship for the first time since the Patrick Ewing days of the mid-1980s. The Hoyas 1984 national champions appear to have a lock on one of the 16 berths come NCAA Tournament time.
