JOHN SILVI
Mr. Silvi, 84, of Livonia died Feb. 26 in St. Mary Hospital, Livonia.
Born in Rome, Italy, Mr. Silvi was a salesman of heavy equipment for Bell Equipment, retiring in 1976, and a former professional wrestler in the 1940s and '50s.

He was once light heavyweight wrestling champion in Canada. Wrestling under the name The Panther Man, his partners included Louis Klein and Bert Ruby.
An author, he had developed an interest in handwriting analysis, among many other pursuits, and wrote the book "Handwriting and the Human Mind."

Mr. Silvi's family moved to Canada when he was 3. At age 18 he joined the Russell Brothers Circus, and for 14 to 15 years was aerial gymnast and acrobat with several different circuses.
He was a race driver in the 1930s, driving a Piedmont Special. He wrote music, mostly ballads and some hymns, but only one was published, "Where Are You Now?"

A former stuntman and daredevil, he once pulled a car with his teeth using a cable tied to the front bumper. He also once served as a bouncer on the Bob-Lo boat.
Survivors include his wife, Eleanor; sons, Donald and James of Livonia; stepdaughters, Valerie Clark of Farmington, Barbara Work of Farmington; stepsons, Thomas Panackia Jr. of Phoenix, Joseph Panackia of Farmington Hills; sister, Mary Sarelli of Hamilton, Ontario.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development has advised the City of Farmington Hills that it is entitled to receive \$304,000.00 for the 1991-92 Community Development Block Grant Program Year. These funds, as authorized by the Department of Housing and Urban Development under Title 14 of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 and 1977, are intended to fund an estimated \$400,000.00 to be received in program income by the Housing Rehabilitation activities. Notice is hereby given that on Monday, March 18, 1991, at 7:30 P.M. Eastern Standard Time, in the Council Chamber of the City Hall, 31555 Eleven Mile Road, City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, at which time and place the Farmington Hills City Council will conduct a Public Hearing to discuss the proposed use of Community Development Block Grant funds.

The proposed statement of Community Development objectives and proposed use of funds for the 1991-92 CDBG Program Year is as follows:

PROPOSED STATEMENT OF COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM YEAR 1991-92

The City of Farmington Hills has considered the various eligible projects which may be undertaken with Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds. These activities range from construction of sidewalks, storm sanitary sewers, water lines and street paving to public services, code enforcement, historic preservation, etc. After careful evaluation of these projects, it has been determined that the highest priority of needs for low and moderate income areas in the community would be achieved through the following expenditure of CDBG funds:

Capital improvement projects for possible consideration include: (1) Salisbury Ambleth Drainage Improvement section 33. Estimated cost \$60,000.

(2) Grand River Sidewalk Improvement (south side) sections 33 and 35. Estimated cost \$10,000.

(3) Edmonson Drainage Improvement section 33. Estimated cost \$60,000.

(4) Grand River Drainage Improvement section 33. Estimated cost \$60,000.

(5) Fenell Drainage Improvement section 33. Estimated cost \$60,000.

Placement of only a portion of these projects could be completed due to the funding levels. It is felt, however, that an opportunity for public discussion should be given on these projects.

All CDBG activities have been designed to avoid the displacement of persons. In the event displacement becomes necessary, the City will assist displaced persons in accordance with the Federal Uniform Relocation Act.

1990-91 CDBG Program - Final Statement of Community Development Objectives and Proposed Use of Funds for 1990-91 Program Year included the above distribution of funds. It is anticipated that on May 31, 1991, the final 1991-92 Program Year, the status of the expenditures will be as follows:
