FARMINGTON The instrumental music departments of Farmington's four junior highs will present the fourth annual Festival of Bands Concert in Power Junior High gymnasium at 8 p.m. Friday, March 5. Participating will be the bands from Power, East, O.E. Dunckel and Farmington junior highs.

EACH of the bands will perform two selections from their program to be presented at the District IV, Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association Festival in Roseville on March 20.

In most formation, the combined bands will conclude the concert March 5 with the "Don Gate of Kiev."

DOG THAT BIT BOY IS SOUGHT
A young Farmington boy will soon have to undergo a painful series of treatment for rabies unless police are able to find the dog which bit him.

The 14-year-old boy was bitten while on the way to school about 7:30 a.m. on Wednesday, Feb. 24, according to Robert Deadman, public safety director for the City of Farmington.

Deadman says police only want to check the dog to see if it has rabies and stressed punitive action will not be taken against the dog's owner.

The dog which is suspected of biting the boy had been seen for some time in the 10-Mile Power Rd. area but has not been seen since the boy was bitten.

The dog being sought is a Labrador Retriever type with short black hair, white on its chest, and white on the four paws with considerably more white hair on three paws than on the fourth.

The animal has a collar, and its owner probably lives in the area of 10 Mile and Power Rd. Anyone with information about the dog is urged to call the city police at 474-1212 as soon as possible.
