futons. The mattresses also come with ool inserts or with dayeron cottor filling. And there's a new one called "soft touch." made of polyester fiber mixed with the cotton to prevent

JOE MULLER, owner of West Coast Futons in West Bloomfield, will have another futon mattress in stock soon with a three-inch convoluted foam core. "It's what I sleep on at home and it's excellent," he said. "That thing is very much like a mattress. It conforms to the curves in your body."

Muller also touts the futon's versatility in that the mattress covers can be taken off and washed. Or if you want to redecorate, you can buy another cover for about \$70. That's impossible with a traditional sofa bed.

"You can drop a pizza on (a futon), take the cover off and wash it," Muller said. "And it's childproof. There are no springs to break, so you can jump on it

all you want."
East/West Futons and West Coast Futons carry a bevy of different cevers, everything from solid colors to eye-catching designs. They even offer a service whereby customers can order handpainted covers: "So it lets people be a little creative even if they're not artsy," said Mary Kay Ausum of East/West.

Ausum's brother and business partner, John Heinlen, said some people who had futons in college come into the store and gape at the latest variations. "They've really evolved into a nice piece of furniture that can go in any home." Ausum said.

INDEED. THE frames can be made with pine, poplar, maple, oak, cherry, walnut, ash and more. You can buy futons in sizes from twin-bed up to

Many frames can be bought with any number of different style detachable arms. The A-frame futon frame can be used as a love seat or a chaise lounge and pulled out to bed form in about two seconds. West Bloomfield resident Annette

Risen bought two full-size, A-frames from East/West last October. She put all-cotton futons on the frames and stuck them in an all-purpose room of the condominium she shares with husband Herb.

People who have slept on them have said they were comfortable," she said. "I really am pleased with them."

Walter Hamilton bought a futon sofa for \$700 from West Coast Futons last December, "(My wife) saw the store and she told me she wanted me to go with her and look around," Hamilton said, "We liked everything we saw in

Unlike traditional mattresses futons won't wear out with age in a few years. "The futon mattress will actually firm up a bit." Heinlen said. "It will not break down, will not become mushy-

THE ALL COTTON futons, in fact, become firmer with time, and some people like it that way.

Muller said he delivered a new frame to a customer and suggested they buy a new futon mattress that wouldn't be as hard as the one they had "No way," the customer said. "It took me five years to get it that way

While some large furniture stores in the area carry a futon or two. Ausum and, the only place one can see a full hne of lutions are at the futon-only

Ausum's sister, Nancy, runs another East West store in Royal Oak Altogether, as far as Ausum, Heinlen and Muller know, they have the only futon stores in the Metro Detroit area

And business is booming. "The business is growing steadily as people discover what futons are," Ausum

Even dogs are getting with the program. Ausum's dog. Spats, sleeps on a small square futon on the floor. "My dog loves her futon," Ausum said. "And it keeps her off our furniture."

MULLER IS perhaps a greater. argument for the efficacy of the futon business. As an advertising salesman for WOMC radio, he handled East/ West's account

Muller liked futons so much, and as that East/West was the only futen store in the area, that he ditched his radio job to open a futon store

And in an era when many people like to keep their money in the country, futons are a terrific buy. despute their Japanese ancestry Muller gets his futons from Wisconsin and his frames from Tennessee.
