The catching job is a contest between senior Jedd Gallus, who didn't play last year, and juniors Mike Hamill and Adam Chalmers. One of three juniors — Brian Lee, Jon Sturtz or Jack Wilks — will be the left fielder.

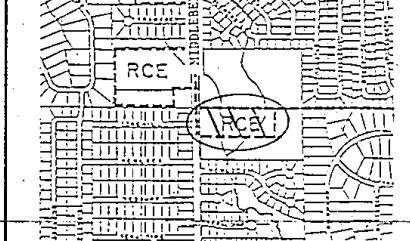

The Falcons lost 14 seniors to graduation, including all-area pitcher Chris Schmidt and all-area outfielder Kevin Young. Coach Kevin Kansman virtually had to start from scratch this year.

"Each year is different, and you work with what you have," he said. "That's not to say I don't look ahead to two and three years down the road, but once the year is under way I don't think about what happened last year or who we have to replace."

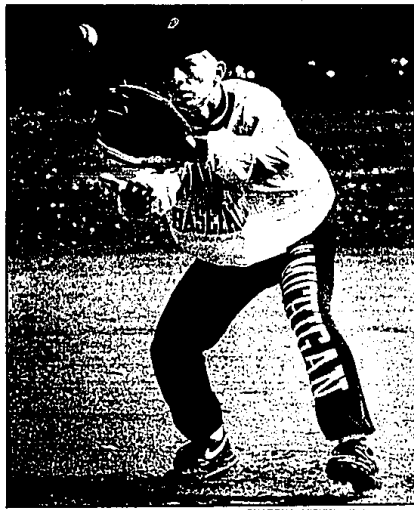
Plumley has no varsity experience as a pitcher but will be one of the workhorses on the mound, Kansman said.

The pitching candidates include senior Les Luark and juniors Mike Schelp, Dave Burgess, Steve Femmer, Brandon Cagnon and Brian Parriah. All are right-handers except Cagnon. All of the juniors played on the JV team last season.

"We need innings," Kansman said. "All these guys need to pitch innings. With so many who can pitch, the number will get knocked down so the guys who can throw strikes will get the work."

Farmington has only four seniors this year, including Adam Hibbs and Mike Cromwell. Hibbs will start at second base, and the rest of the infield will have junior Brian Wilson at first, Schelp at shortstop and Plumley at third. Junior Dave Link is the catcher.

when not pitching. Burgess is left and junior Brian Afflerbaugh is right. Burgess, a converted infielder, Afflerbaugh, junior Scott Komula and senior Matt Slatosky spent two years on the JV.

Slatosky, a three-sport star who played football and wrestled, was going to be the catcher, but he had knee surgery recently. It's uncertain whether or not he will play this year.

"I don't know as much about these players, because they don't have the varsity experience," Kansman said.

"This team is going to have to work hard, because it doesn't have experience and most of the teams in the league do."

"We have to play the games and then evaluate in practice. Last year we could set our goals and go for them. This year we have to set them as we go along."

"We're going to improve more this year than we did last year. That doesn't mean we're going to do better at the end, but we're going to be better than the team we start with."

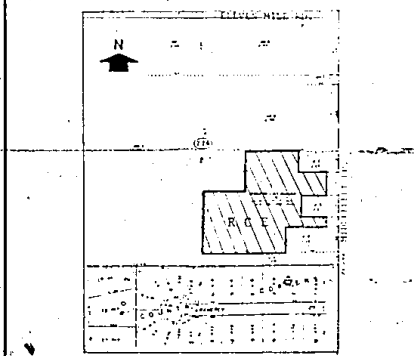

# Boots released from CC duties

soccer, and soccer is a major concern in my life. If they were interested, they would have at least have a permanent field with permanent goals."

CC DOES NOT have its own soccer field and Boots complained about having to play at Bell Creek Park and having to spend about "a half-hour" before and after practices putting up the goalposts.

"We played across a softball field and I had to set up the field, put goal posts up and paint the field," said Boots, who played baseball at Indiana University before severely injuring a knee. "I complained daily to anybody (at CC) that would listen. They would just say, 'It's not available. John, get used to it.' More kids play soccer in this area than baseball, football and basketball together and it should be a viable product for CC and they need to realize the importance of the sport in this area."

"If they approached soccer like they do the basketball and football programs, they would be unequal."

Finding a place to play is not uncommon at CC, which faces that problem in most of its varsity sports.

"Bell Creek is not the finest field to play on, but what are our options," Santello said. "We tried (Livonia) Bentley and they said it's already overused. We tried Clarencville, but we already play football games there and they said playing soccer on it would be too much. We've tried Redford Union and Thurston and they said no. There just isn't any field around that could accommodate us."

"IF YOU TAKE a look at CC as a

whole, the tennis team plays at the Livonia YMCA and Schoolcraft College. Baseball plays at Capital Park. And we use the Thurston and Farmington Mercy tracks. The swimmers use the Mercy pool. Being on campus for 11 years, this is nothing new."

Boots brought an impressive coaching resume with him to Michigan, as he was 114-12-8 in six years of coaching boys high school soccer in Indiana. He reached the state championship game three times without winning a title.

Boots said he'll miss the opportunity to coach CC next year, since the Shamrocks return an impressive group, including All-Observer half-back Kerry Zavagnin. As a junior, Zavagnin scored 20 goals and had 24 assists.

"THEY HAVE the talent to win the state tournament," Boots said. "It's a phenomenal group of kids, well-rounded academically and talent wise. I wish them all the best of luck."

Boots, who last summer coached the 1974 Michigan Magic Wolves to a national championship, has no intentions of returning to the high school level at this time.

"I'm sourced on high school soccer right now," he said.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the Farmington Hills Planning Commission will give formal consideration to a proposed text amendment of the Farmington Hills City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, which amendment will amend Section 34-3. A summary of said amendment is as follows:

1. Change Section 34-3 Definitions  
Housing for the elderly means a dwelling unit designed especially for the use and occupancy of elderly persons. Elderly persons will be defined as individuals who have attained the age of sixty-two (62) years or two (2) individuals of which either person has attained the age of sixty-two (62) years as of the date of occupancy. Only an occupant who establishes lawful residence pursuant to the foregoing definition may continue such residence despite the subsequent death or absence of the elder resident.
