Sheri Kurtz, a Power Middle School student, is a finalist in the Scholastic Writing Awards sponsored by the New York-based Scholastic Inc.

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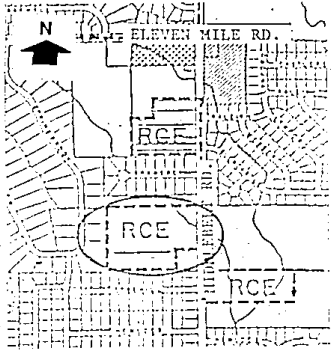
