A special award ceremony Monday left Bill Burke speechless — a
rarity according to Burke and those
who have served alongside him on
the Farmington Planning Commission over the past 30 years.
Family members Joined to give
the longtime community servant a
"1991 Human Spirit Award" Monday
inglit, as a surprise kickoff to the
commission's monthly meeting.

"It's a culmination of a lifetime of commitment," said son Kelly Burke, a Maryland reddent who was visiting this week and planned the event with other family members. "It's a fella who's sort of a throwback. It (community service) was always just what you were supposed to do. "It's been inspirational to me." The Human Spirit Award came in the form of a plaque presented, according to its wording, "for 30 years of caring for community and family."

BURKE WAS a bit embarrassed and quite surprised at the ceremony, calling it "as pleasant, as can be. These emotions are very hard to put into words," he added.

Burke began his city service years ago, following his involvement in the Floral Park homeowners group. "I was one of their early presidents, and used to come to council meetings," he said. He was recommended for the planning commission post, and appointed. "And with that, it began."

As president of the commission for about eight years, and a member of the other 22. Burke has a stended, literally, thousands of meetings and public hearings. He is proud of the commission's record and its apparent good relationship with the city council, which "carely reverses something we've recommended."

Burke has seen the city change from one experiencing growth to one that is fully developed. Today, he said, the planning commission's role has changed from one of monitoring

OVER HIS 30-year tenure, several major Issues have given him a sense of fulfillment, Burke said.

The building of Farmington Place senior housing complex on Grand River, which was a highly controversial development. "I felt it was pretty important to the community," he said. "I thought it was the right thing to do. I was proud that went in."

• Preservation of the residential historic district. "There was a time when Oakland was in obsolescence in the master plan," he added.
