Still stinks: school's air to be tested By Casey Hans stall writer

A lingering odor caused by a tile glue remover used in the renovation of Gill Elementary six weeks ago to the following the strength of the st

and believed to be used in the grow-remover.

"The smell is still with us," said principal Michael Duff. "There has been, some staff_rancern_over_it."

We're on top of the situation.

Over the school spring break in late March contractors used a chemical to remove tile mastic from-four rooms in the southwest side Farmington little school as part of a major building renovation and addi-tion project. Because of the strong-odor which remained after the

break, school was closed down for two days, Duff said. The three classrooms and a teach-ers' lounge in which tile was re-moved still have the odor, and several staff members reportedly remain concerned about air throughout the

concerned about air turougnous uschool.

An initial air test contracted for by the district shows no tooleity in the air, while officials of the Farmington Education Association are testing the air this week for a comparative sampling. FEA president Jim Minor sald members "are still concerned. Hopefully, between the two of them (tests) everything will be OK. If not, we'll have to revisit it."

AS A SAFEGUARD, three class-rooms of students are now-bused dai-ly to nearby Longacre Elementary, where they are schooled in portable classrooms, Dulf said. Cities sort out recycling plans

Farmington and Farmington Hilts residents will pay a quarterly fee to separate and recycle their garbage at their curbside.

The new program — and billing period — begins July 1. A few ordinance, to be enacted Monday, May 20, by both the Farmington and Farmington Hills city councils, also will take effect that day.

"There's going to be a lot of bugs we have to work out." Farmington Hills city manager William Costick said, referring to working out some details of the new recycling program.

For example, each single family homeowner and condeminium owner — with a separate entrance — to accommodate curbside pickup — will receive a yellow and green recycling bin City officials expect that somewhere along the line, someone will sell their house and take the bin with them instead of leaving it for the new residents. "It's going to happen. We anticipate they will probably have to buy a new one." Farmington Hills public services director Tom Biasell said.

Board candidate: Schools must 'justify every dollar'

Editor's note: Coverage of the 1991 Farmington school board race continues with a profile of challenger Richard DeVires Election coverage will continue throughout May. The election is June 10.

This is Richard DeVries' according to the Farmington school board. And the Altycarcold, challenger hopes the approach he labels "fiscal responsibility" will garner enough votes to win him a seat on the board. If elected, DeVries plans to focus on successful budget-cutting, goal-setting and increased academic achievement in the district. He wants more money for instructional areas and better efficiency and mon-

eysaving techniques in each department.
"We've got to go right down the ISI. We've got to justify every dollar," said DeVries, a Ford Motor Co. engineer who is martred and the father of three and lives in Farmington Hills. His sons attend Hillsde and Highmeadow elementaries and a preschool daughter is still at home. His wife, Jil), is a teacher.
He said six of seven board members have no children in the school

district, and he believes it's his turn. "To them, it's an academic ex-ercise," he said "To me it's the fu-ture of three children. I think the board should be a check and balance in the administration. "I'm running because I can feel I can make a contribution.

DeVRIES IS vying for a nonpar-tisan four-year school board term against two-term meumbent and Farinington Hills bank executive So-san Rennels, and challenger Laura Myers who is a parent and communi-ty activist. In the 1990 campaign, beVires placed fourth in a state of nine candidates, and has gotten the support of resident and school board watcher Robert Ranney who can for the board in both 1989 and 1990. Holding both a bachelor of science and master of arts degrees from the University of Michigan where he

now teaches courses during the summer. DeVries believes the school board needs a member with a strong background, training and experience in science and technology. He is a member of the Pniversity of lowa National Science Foundation Re-

DeVries targets spending, district goals

Facing one incumbent and another challenger for one seat on the Farm-ington School board June 10, chal-lenger Richard DeVries:

Is concerned with test scores and other measures of the district's performance, but is honing in on the

district's spending. He is determined it can do well with the money it has.

Believes not enough money is being put into instruction in the dis-trict. "We've got a whole army of people who are consultants and coor-dinators. Some of these are the best

teachers." he said. "It doesn't do my kids much good if they aren't in the classroom."

Said the district needs to set better goals, or ways of measuring student successes and the district's performance.

• Advocates a full school board packet be available to the public for review at each meeting "Every-thing that goes in the board packet should be available to the public," be said. He also wants each person who took the time to write to the board to receive a response.
