Township where be was arrested, Nebus said. Farmington Hills' investigatory and evidence technicians as well as petroit police evidence technicians collected evidence from the Wormer street house. Search warrants also were conducted of the man and his ear. Blood, hair, saliva, fingerprints and paim prints were collected for evidence. Nebus said.
