# **School board OKs** \$97 million budget

Farmington school trustees have approved an increased, \$95.95 million annual budget, with board president and candidate Sucan Rennels voling against two related measures because she believes the district should roll back the milliage rate.

The 6-1 votes for 1991-92 budget and tax rate came at a regular school board meeting Tuesday, as a Farmington police officer sat in the lobby because of an anonymous death threat called into school offices over the past weekend.

The reason for the threat, called into a taped phone line used for substitute employees, is not known. Police are taking the malter seriously and continue investigating it with the help of the state police.

Rennels, who faces two challengers in the June 10 school election in her bid for a third board term, said sentiment in the community is against new taxes even though the district may need them.

"It is apparent there is a misunderstanding... about how the budget works," Rennels said, detailing how the community has reacted to millage requests and bond issues over the past few years. "In no way does this (vote mean id on ot support Mr. (school superintendent Michael) Flanagan and his staff."

Challenger Richard DeVries also spoke out Tuesday against "the roll up of tax rates." DeVries Rennels and Laura Myers will square off for one board seat this Monday.

The operating millage rate for the district will increase slightly July 1 from \$2.05 to \$2.77 mills, with 1.25 mills of that earmarked for a new building and site fund. Also, each mill is worth more because of increased property values. By not rolling back its millage, the district is taking an average \$5.3 percent increase, but school officials believe much of that will be eaten up by state aid recapture. The school district, which covers the city of Farmington, much of Farmington Hills and a portion of West Bloomfield Township, is the largest taxing agency in the area. The new budget, effective July 1, includes:

A total of \$83.9 million in a special Judding and site fund. Of general fund money, \$73.9 is budgeted for expenditures with \$4 million to be held in reserve.

A reduction of what would be equivalent to \$6 full-time teaching positions, \$99 support-personnel positions, \$29 maintenance and food service positions, between \$1.2 bus drivers and six administrative sitols. It also includes various program cuts which will impact transport.

William boll, 36, formerly of Detroit, stood mute to the felony charge at his arraignment in 38th District Court. Detroit, Friday, A not guilty plea was entered on his behalf.

Bond was not set and Doll was remanded back to the Wayne County Jail. Preliminary examination on the charge is scheduled for a non-cetion with the death of Kristine Albert of Livonia, whose partally nucle body was found in a Farmington Hills field Feb. 7.

Monday is school election day throughout the state, and three candidates for the Farmington Board of Education are winding down their campaigns by going door to door, telephoning voters and doing last-minute literature mailings.

Business support services director for the Farmington district, Betsi Rothrock, said Tuesday that 234 ab-sentee ballots had been issued— about triple what the district nor-mally sends out for a June election but not as many as they malled for
