## Harrison's senior scholars honored at Swing Out

Graduating Harrison High School seniors were honored by their peers recently at the school's end-of-the-year "Swing Out" program, according to information from the school.

Included were three civic scholarships totalling \$2,150, 10 community scholarships and awards totalling \$2,800, 56 state scholarships and tuition grants totalling \$10,050, and 22 Michigan university and college scholarships totalling \$107,300.

Out-of-state university scholarships given to Harrison students totalling \$78,600.
