Details are still up in the air, but it ap-pears the Kroger Co. will participate in a ran service two days a week to transport senior adults to its new 12 Mile Road super-

store.
"It just hasn't been completely finalized,"
said Kroger spokesman Michael Layne.
In a May 22 letter to Farmington Hills
city manager William Costick, Jerry Peru,
Kroger vice president of retail operations,
acknowledged acceptance of the van program, which comes with an estimated price

gram, which could be a support the van on a two-times-per-week basis. We would like to re-evaluate this service at the end of this

The van service stems from complaints from many senior adults after Kroger bought the Great Scottl chain and closed two smaller stores in November at the Grand River-Halsted shopping center in Farmington and at 13 Mile and Orchard Lake in Farmington Hills.

A DAY LATER, the new 43,000 square-fect supermarket opened a couple miles away in the Halsted Village Shopping Cen-ter, 3755 0 12 Mile, at Halsted. The closing of the two smaller stores in-furiated some residents, particularly senior adults near the Grand River-Halsted store, who liked walk to do their grocery shop-ping.

"Whenever a corporation will take the time or the money to help a community or seniors, that's commendable," said Farmington councilwoman Johanne McShane. "It will help some people. But it doesn't take away the fact that there's residents who want to shop in a neighborhood store." McShane led a petition drive among residents, particularly senior adults, urging Kroger to allow another grocer to lease space at the former Farmington Kroger soire.

The Farmington store has since been leased to Kiddie Land. The 13 Mile and Orchard Lake store is owned by Kroger, and company officials said in March they would not prevent another grocer from buying the facility.

"I hate to see this just lay. But I don't

know what else what can be done,"
McShane said.

The estimated \$12,480 van service budget
includes the "normal coats" for operating a
van, considering fuel, routine maintenance
and a driver's wages of about \$120 a day,
said Costick, who contacted Kroger on behalf of both Farmington and Farmington
Hills officials and residents.
"They (Kroger) would pick up the whole
thing," he added.

PRELIMINARY PLANS call for a van to stop at about 10 apartment complexes that are either exclusively for senior adults or have a large number of senior adult resi-dents, Costick said.

The van is expected to be donated by Michigan National Bank's Independence for

Life program. When the program begins de-pends on when the city receives the van. "We've got a lot of things to set up yet," he said. "The senior adult staff will get the word out."

Changes are expected once the program is under way because certain pick-up sites may not be the ideal ones or may not draw as many senior adults as would another site,

In his telter to Costick, Perun sald Kroger also plans to start a 10-percent discount for all senior adults' food purchases on Tuesdays of each week. Perun also wrote that Kroger staff visited nearly homes and apartments and passed out envelopes to senior adults with coupons for purchases and free goods.

Former youth coach pleads not guilty to sex charges

The parents of the boys whom Garden City youth league coad James William "Bill" Stoller is accused of sexually molesting in his southfield apartment went to Oakland County circuit Judge John O'Brien's courtroom Monday hoping to hear the defendant plead guilty. But be didn't.

Instead, defense attorney Jerome Fenton entered a not-guilty plea for his client in all of the 15 cases and 35 counts against him. The alleged vic-tims are six of the boys he coached in baseball and basketball during the past four years.

STOLLER WAS in the courtroom just long enough for the plea to be made and also to be arraigned on 15 counts of being a habitual offender.

"I don't think anybody knew what to expect today," one of the mothers of the boys said after the arraign-ment. "We had hoped he would plead guilty so the children and their par-ents wouldn't have to go through this any longer."

The first warrants were issued against Stoller on April 7 after the mother of a 13-year-old boy in the baseball league told Southfield police the coach had molested her son at this apartment three days earlier.

Other parents went to apthorities to report similar incidents after the first case became public. The charges against Stoller include counts of first-degree criminal sexual conduct, each carrying a maximum penalty of life in prison, and counts of second degree, which are 15-year felonies.

FENTON ANNOUNCED after Monday's arraignment that Stoiler had been administered a blood test for AIDS and that the results would be available in two or three weeks. "He has absolutely no fear that be
