Judge Margaret Schaeffer on Monday ordered Aidem, president and
sole officer of Utah Mortgage of
Farmington Hills, to stand trial in
circuit court on one count of larceny

circuit court on one count of larceny by conversion. If convicted, Aldem could be sentenced to five years in prison and fined \$4,500. Defense attorney Rand Davidson said after the ruling that Aldem maintains his innocence and instated the matter abould be settled in civil court. The examination was interrupted May 13 to give Davidson time to study documents needed to prepare his defense.

LAST MONTH, Dr. Robert Netzel, a Bloomfield Hills ophthalmologist and a trustee of the Orchard Lake Ophthalmologist Profit Sharing Plan, testified that in 1987 he invest-ed \$14,000 of the plan's money with

Utah Mortage and that the firm failed to pay any interest and all but \$2,000 of the principal.

According to Netzel's testimony, aldem promised the opbthalmologists that they would be repaid as soon as Utah foreclosed on a business to which it had loaned \$250,000 in 1988.

However, the recipient of the loan Michael Weger, president of Weger Petroleum, testified that his company was never subject to foreclosure and that he repaid the loan in 1986.
