- **STARS IN THE PARK**
Bring your lawn chairs or blankets to enjoy the sounds of big bands, jazz and contemporary music throughout the summer at Heritage Park. The Farmington Concert Band will kick off the series on Thursday, May 30, at 8 p.m. There is no fee for this program.
- **AMUSEMENT PARK TICKETS**
Tickets for your favorite amusement park can be bought at a discount rate at the Recreation Office.
