BAG LIMIT REDUCED

In an effort to better balance the buck-doe ratio in the state, the Mich-igan Department of Natural Re-sources and the Natural Resource Commission have agreed to reduce the bag limit on whitetail deer for the 1991 season. Hunters will be allowed four deer instead of five, but only two bucks instead of four. Hunters may decide for themselves if they want to take to two buck limit with a bow and arrow, rifle or shotgun, muzzlelaad-er or any combination of methods. The first archery license is still good
