

Cable gives composers credit where credit is due

Every television program is made up of visuals/video and sounds/audio. The visuals are created by personal preference depicting the subject of the show. Unless there are pictures, such as art work or artifacts, one usually does not have to worry about copyright clearance.

However, the audio portion of the program most times is representational of someone else's thoughts or verbalized statements. When someone else's work is used, it is important to give them credit. Laws are in place to help insure that we do that. The American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers works to make sure people are given credit, and receive proper residuals for registered works. Community Access Television is non-commercial; it is non-profit; nevertheless, we have a responsibility to respect others' works.

When we add music to our television program, at the beginning or end of the show, or throughout, we must give credit and receive permission from the author or publisher of the works. This may be a easy task or one that may be quite tedious. To ease this process, we have registered with the DeWolfe Music Library. This provides us with copyright-free music in all categories.

Examples of works we have in our

library are the Top 1920's and 30's; User's Guide to the Classics; Jazz and Pop; Current Affairs, News and Industry; Large Orchestral Pieces; Keyboard Sounds for Sports and Action; and Contemporary Rock and Pop Styles. This library is housed on compact discs and may accompany your program as you produce your show at the new facility at the Southwestern Oakland Cable Commission. A similar library on records is housed at MetroVision for your convenience as well.
