Mask making helps students bridge gap

At Kenbrook Elementary, fourth and fifth graders learned about various cultures and the art of mask making recently through an enrichment class taught by art consultant. Through the centuries, masks were used in theater, for burial and death and for a variety of festivals, students learned. Not only do masks hide the identity of the wearer, but give the person magic powers of the gods or spirits.

STUDENTS FIRST learned about Mexican, Japanese and African cul-tures, then designed and created masks using a variety of media in-cluding foil tooling, oil pastels, felt-

tip markers, yarn, beads, raffla, paints, foam, construction paper and floral plastic ribbon.

The enrichment mask making classes "developed a social responsibility, awareness, understanding, respect and tolerance of other people and their cultural differences," Barsamian sald.

The masks were in a traveling ex-hibit throughout the Farmington schools this spring.
