



Downtown promos get a financial boost

Farmington DDA pledges more funds

ALFWAY THROUGH a summer promotions program which has drawn hundreds of peo-

ple to downtown Farmington each week, the Downtown Development Authority has pledged more money for future promotional efforts. The DDA board voted Tuesday to spend up to \$10,000 for DDA-spon-sored promotions, matching doilar-

for-dollar money put up by the Downtown Farmington Business Association merchants' group-DDA member and city manager Robert Deadman called the money "piedog grants" and said it would allow the DDA focus to be "overall promotions downtown, while theirs (the merchants) would be to make the cash register ring." Downtown merchant and DDA member Michele Jakacki said the DFBA business group plans to pro-pose an annual fee of 1510 to its membership to cover membership dues and participation, in down-town promotions, Including direct mail and advertising. Based on past promotions, Jakacki said, the plan would be a money-saver.

THE DDA PLEDGE of more money came after a report on the group's current promotion — a 10-week summer promotions program which offers mid-day entertain-ment downtown each Wednessday. The first promotion of Safety City drew more than 600 people, the second promotion of Upland
