

Hearing Thursday on senior concerns

A legislative task force examining the concerns of Michigan senior citizens will conduct a public hearing in Farmington Hills on Thursday, July 18, said an area lawmaker who is hosting the event.

State Rep. Jan Dolan, R-Farmington Hills, has invited the House Republican Task Force on Senior Policy to solicit public testimony beginning at 10 a.m. in the conference room of the Farmington Hills Community Library, 32737 W. 12 Mile Road.

Dolan, a member of the task force, said the group is developing long-range goals on a variety of important issues.

"Long-term care will be a watershed issue in the 1990s," Dolan said. "We need to make crucial decisions on what care can and should be provided and who will fund and deliver those services. We're eager to hear from the public and I encourage any interested citizens to attend the hearing."

The Farmington Hills stop is the first in a statewide series of hearings for the task force, chaired by Rep. Walter DeLange, R-Kentwood.

TRYING To offset the negative image of Magon being portrayed by the defense counsel, Seixas said, "He was not a film-film man who went around trying to con people out of their savings. We all try to pretend we're something we're not, and Dan did that very well. I don't think that's a crime."

But Seixas admitted Magon had a reputation for leaning on friends, family and women he dated. Magon got money and support since 1985, when he injured his back and was unable to continue working as a truck driver.

In court, defense attorney David Binkley asked for the report he said shows outstanding warrants on Ma-

gon — one for unpaid child support. Binkley was told by Judge Margaret Schaefer that he'll have to petition the state police for that information. Binkley also asked for a list of all had taken to police before the shooting in an effort to implicate Magon. The list contained the names of people Magon tried to kill, Floriano said.

After the examination, Seixas said he knew Magon was having trouble making child support payments, given his sporadic employment. Magon said Floriano bought him some new clothes and gave him "\$200 or \$300 some time in May," he added.

"This man may have given Ray every reason to be upset — enough to have him go down and try to file charges — or kick him out of his place," said Seixas, who sat behind Magon's 20-year-old son and 16-year-old daughter during the court proceedings.

Charity fund-raisers and special event planners in Oakland, Wayne and Macomb counties no longer have to live in fear that their event will lose patrons to another event set for the same date.

A new community service is being offered to the tri-county area by The Community House in Birmingham — The Community Calendar.

It's a direct response to the lament that charity, cultural and educational organizations frequently and inadvertently schedule events in competition with each other.

The service is being patterned after a similar

one based at the Field Museum in Chicago.

"Fund-raisers in the Chicago area wouldn't dream of scheduling a benefit without checking out competition for the date at the museum," reports Wally Klein, a Bloomfield Township resident who is a member of the community calendar committee.

And, like the Chicago model, The Community Calendar will be a free service.

- Nature and name of the event.
- Name of the sponsoring organization.
- Date, time and place.
- Name and telephone number of a contact person.

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Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

WASHINGTON—A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Researchers in Europe found that an ingredient in the aptly named produce Food Source One actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious British Journal of Nutrition. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in intestinal absorption of calories.

While the development of Food Source One, a project of National Dietary Research, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the discovery has been a windfall for overweight people.
