If it hadn't been for the two trucks that flew off neighboring 1-27s. Joan Barber (flgures she width) in the state of the

After almost 20 years Barber is getting some kind of barrier. But it's not a noise barrier, it's a five-feet tall safety barrier. They tell me they are going to do the design this fall for installation next spring," said Leo DeFraine, supervisor of the Michigan Department of Transportation's materials and technology division. technology division.

THE SAFETY barrier has two parts. One is the actual 40-inch tall barrier. A second part will be what's called a glare screen, which is made of concrete and takes the barrier up to a height of live feet, DeFraine said. This can help with the noise somewhat," be

added.
"I suppose five feet is better than nothing,"

said Barber, responding to news of the safety barrier. "I bet they would not have put it up if I had not had two trucks come over and a

I had not had two trucks come over and a fire."

In addition to the trucks — one landed in her front yard, the other in her backyard — Barber's yard caught fire in 1988 when some-one apparently, threw a lit cigarette out of their car window while on the freeway.

The safety barrier might stop the trucks, but Barber is still looking for an honest-to-good-ness noise barrier. But the state keeps saying no.


Barber is quick to compare her historic home with those in Camelot Court, for example, on the south side of 1-596, west of Middle-bolt, that are getting noise buffers. And she's

not. "Why is the state putting up additional berms for the subdivision backing 1-696? They bought in there knowing their bornes would back onto the freeway." Barber said. "When I came to my home, I didn't know a freeway would go in there."
But state transportation officials say there is a difference.

Father, son arraigned in Little League fight

A Farmington Hills father and adult son face misdemeanor charges in connection with the beatings of two men at a Little League game June 13 at Kenbrook Elementary

School.
Glenn A. Warhelt, 31, and his fa-ther Phillip I. Warhelt, 54, both pleaded not gullty to charges Friday morning before 47th District Court Judge Fred Harris in Farmington. Glenn Warhelt is charged with one

misdemeanor count of assault and battery and one count of aggravated assault, which is a high misdemeanor. He is free on \$1,500 personal bond.

Phillip Warbeit is charged with one count of assault and battery. He is free on \$500 personal bond.

A date for a prellininary examination on the charges in 47th District Court has not yet been set.

Conviction of assault and battery carries a maximum penalty of days in jail and \$500 fine. Aggravated assault carries a maximum pen
