Southfield police seeking black hit-and-run vehicle

Southfield police are seeking help in identifying the driver of "a black Bronco, Blazer or Jeep-like vehicle" involved in a hit-and-run accident in Southfield Saturday night that left a pedestrian in criti-cal condition.

Police Sgt. Steve Zultowski said the accident occurred at 10 p.m. on the northbound lance of Telegraph at Swanson south of 11 Mile.
The victim, Willie Byre, 28, of Detroit, remained in critical condition earlier this week in Provience Hospital suffering from internal injuries.

Based on witness accounts of the accident, Zultowski said police be-lieve Byre was running across the northbound lanes from east to west when he was hit by the northbound vehicle. The driver drove from the scene

"The vehicle should have damage to the front end and to the right side mirror," Zultowski said. Anyone who can bely identify or locate the driver is asked to call Southfield police at 554-4720.

The accident remains under investigation by the police traffic safety bureau.
