
Author-publisher wins coveted award

Bautista also received four pub-lishing awards from Mild-America Publishers Association, an organi-zation of book publishers in the Midwest. His book, "Improve Your Grades" won in three categories, while his other book, "The Book of

U.S. Postal Exams" got the "Total Sales" honorable mention award. "The Book of U.S. Postal Exams," has already sold about 90,000 cop-ies.

Bautista, who writes and publishes his own books through his publishing company, Bookhaus Publishers, is also the author of "The Book of \$16,000-\$60,000 Post Office Jobs." He is releasing another book, "How to Teach Your Child: A Parent's Guide to Helping Kids Get A's" in the fall of this year.

Bautista's distributor to the trade is Publishers Group West. Prior to coming to America from the Philippines in 1976, Bautista published school reference books for the Philippine Ministry of Education and Culture. He was a former member of the editorial staff of "The Manila Chronicle," a daily mewspaper.

A full-time author and a publisher, Bautista lives with his wife, the former Genoveva Abes, a physician.


