Police disarmed explosive device on fuel tank

An explosive device rigged with a timer and attached to a gasoline tank was discovered Monday morning at a Southfield heating and cooling supply business and disarmed safety by the Michigan State Police bomb squad.

It was found at 9:20 a.m. in a rear storage area of Fio-Co Supply on the west side of Telegraph north of Eight Mile by a company employee, police said.

"It was plugged into an outside electrical outlet," said Southfield public safety Director R.G. Tobin. "The fact that the company shuts off the outside power on the weekend may have prevented it from exploding."

Southfield police and federal au-thorities are continuing an investiga-tion into the incident.

Apparently the device was put in place sometime over the weekend while the business was closed, police

Bomb squad member Trooper Bruce Karazia said the "half-ful gasoline tank contained about five gailons" and was sitting on a forklift. "It may or may not have worked if the electricity had been turned on," Karazia said. "We really don't know what the damage would have been if it had exploded."

SOUTHFIELD POLICE and the lire department evacuated the business and the abutting Southfield Mobile Home Park as a precautionary

A state police robot was used to disarm the device. "The robot ren-dered it safe and we went in and drained the tank," Karazia said.

Southfield police Sgt. Steve Zul-owski said the device was disarmed

Michael Zigovitz, controller of Flo-Co, said Tuesday that he didn't want to comment publicly on the incident.

Another employee said, "We're just so busy. It's like a zoo around here."
