It's Gus Macker-style basketball, and it will be making its third appearance at Oakhad University Aug. 24-25.

The Macker Tournament has mushroomed from its humble begin-

nings in Belding to 40 tournaments throughout the nation, from Califor-nia to North Carolina, New Mexico

to New York.

The grandaddy remains the Macker's birthplace. More than 5,000 teams and over 20,000 players flooded Belding last year, and so did 300,000 spectators.

OU CAN'T MATCH that tidal wave of enthuslasm. But there were 1,150 teams that played at OU's '90 Macker, with an estimated 30,000 people in attendance. That was a re-

spectable increase from the first year, when 750 teams faced off in the inaugural OU Macker.

The rules of the game are simple: It's 3-0n-3 basketball, with games up to 20 baskets (must win by two). A long-range shot counts for two. Approximately 130 portable courts will be set up around Oakland's campus. OU tournament organizer Bob Taylor has targeted 1,000 teams as his goal for this year's Macket.

That will mean about 150 divisions, with roughly 16 teams (somewith less) per division. Play 16 divided by age, height, sex and ability. Each player is given a computer point ranking, the team's computer-points total determines which division it

Should the goals set by Taylor (OU's women's basketball coach) be realized, about 7,500 players and 50,000 fans will flood OU's campus.



 b. Buildings to house animals such as fowl or rabbits shall not be located within seventy-five (15) feet of any property line.
