I set goals, but I'm running out of patience.

How are you setting these goals and what time period do you allow yourself to accomplish your goals?
You might be a little too hard on yourself.
It is far better to set realistic goals and double or triple the time in which you expect to reach them, than to aim too high and feel as though you might have falled and then quit again.
This leeway of time allows you an occasional pat on the back as a reward for meeting small goals on the way up.
Why don't you talk with an exercise professional and decide what your mole are realisticable.

DECIDE WHAT type of exercise will fit within your lifestyle. How about a brisk 10-minute walk at first, maybe adding one minute every third day till you reach 20 minutes? You'll start to feel accomplished without much effort. This is much better than to have set too high of a goal.
It might be best not to shree this long-range goal with your friends. Walt until you feel accomplished and please don't get discouraged.

Changes continue on Paint Creek

FTER NEARLY 15 years of planning and paperwork the bottom draw on Paint Creek at Lake Orlon is in place and in working order. Unfortunately, it's not working quite yet. The project was completed earlier this summer, but because of construction of a new bridge where the creek passes under Broadway Street, 100 yards downstream from the headwaters, the bottom draw has not yet been put into operation. "It's very disappointing," said DNR Pisheries biologist Ron Spitter, who has overseen the development of the project from its inception of the project from its inception test found a 10-degree drop in the water temperature just downstream from the dam. But, because of the construction, we just haven't been able to work with it to see what adjustments we need to make. "Ideally, we'd like to keep the water temperature in the mid-65s throughout the summer. If we can keep it below 70-degrees during the bot, dry days in the middle of the summer we should be OK. Trout can survive in water temperatures in the middle to upper 70s for a short period of dime."

The tube is submerged in 52-dect of water. When operating, the tube will suck cold, oxygenated water from the bottom of the lake. It will not interfere with the level of Lake Orion since the bottom draw will only operate when there is water spilling over the top of the dam. The water from the bottom of the lake picks up more oxygen as it flows down a rock filled gully and into the creek at the base of the dam.


