negotiations team has met yet to discuss the proposal, a spokesman sald, but he is "sare the boad will take it up at an early meeting." The present contract expires Aug. 31, and talks on heat year's pact are due to be tunderway about Afril 20. Under the FEA Jun, an entire contract article would be considered as a single proposal-provided it dealt with one central subject.

HOWEVER, an article such as "working condi-tions," which deals with a variety of subjects, would be considered a separate item for each subject opened for discussion.

Teachers last year worked without a contract until Sept. 23 while a state fact-finder resolved unsettled differences involving salary scales, a fringe benefit pro-gram and supplementary pay schedules.
