

Local Bands Sweep Festival

FARMINGTON
All three Farmington high schools came home with a large collection of honors after competing in the solo and ensemble festival held recently in Oxford High School.

Division I winners from Harrison High School, North Farmington High and Farmington Senior High are now preparing for the state festival which will be held March 27 in Flint.

Fifty-eight entries from Harrison performed in the

festival which was quite a turnout for the school which just opened its doors last fall. Harrison reportedly entered more events than any other school in the district.

Performances were given ratings from one to five on the basis of tone, intonation, interpretation and other aspects of musicianship.

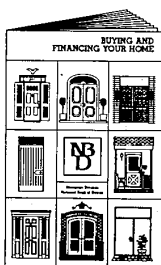
