

Man ruled competent for trial

Judge Fred Harris of the 47th District Court ordered the psychiatric evaluation at McGlin's request in early June.

OAKLAND COUNTY assistant prosecutor Margaret Davis agreed to the psychiatric evaluation.

The shootings, with a high-powered shotgun, occurred about 7:10 p.m., May 31, in front of neighbors and motorists driving along Eight Mile, near Inkster. No one else was injured. A business in the area was damaged by shotgun fire.

Hopkins, who lived temporarily at the Inkster Road house, surrendered to Livonia police immediately after the shootings on the Farmington Hills-Livonia border, police said.

According to information from witnesses, the two shooting victims had severely beaten Hopkins about two weeks before in Detroit.

One of the dead men was found on the sidewalk in front of the dark, one-story house on Inkster Road.

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Resident of damaged apartment riled

The flooding at Muirwood Apartments a week ago was just about enough for Yvonne Rouso. But now she has no carpeting — just nails sticking out of the floor — and she wants out of her lease.

But the Farmington Hills resident says the apartment complex won't let her out of the lease even though it's up in a month and she and her husband, Christopher, plan to move elsewhere.

"We're stuck and we have to live like this," Rouso said. "This whole thing was their (Muirwood's) fault and they aren't helping us out."

Ron Hall, who works for Bantz,

which owns and manages the Muirwood Apartments, did not return the Observer's phone calls.

The Roussos live in one of the some 200 apartments that received water damage from the early Monday storm a week ago that was concentrated in the 10 Mile-Grand River area. Muirwood is at Grand River and Drake. Rouso's apartment is near Drake Road where many of the flooded apartments are located and where a pond to accommodate overflow also is located.

ROUSSO SAID their apartment had about two inches of water. Crews removed her carpeting just before midnight Monday. She and her husband went to a motel for the

night.

But when she returned at 9 a.m. Tuesday, the door to her apartment was open. "They left my apartment open all night. No one even contacted us," she said.

Apartment officials apparently told Rouso the carpet would be returned in about two weeks. But then she and her husband are expected to move out two weeks later.

Rouso said she would be just as happy to move out now. That way apartment crews can put in the new carpeting and paint for a new tenant all in one sweep.

She's also concerned because she has no renters insurance and some of her personal belongings, including her sofa were damaged.

In an effort to at least clean up after the flooding, Rouso said she tried sweeping the cement — that's under the carpeting that had been

taken out — and she discovered nails sticking out.

"What if I had had a baby? Someone can get hurt," she complained.

BUT SHE SAYS apartment officials just won't let her move out before her lease expires. Still, she's convinced she and the others who have been flooded should get some kind of rent deduction.

Rouso referred to the pond in the complex, which is supposed to accommodate overflow. She said she had heard the pond was responsible for similar flooding about five years ago. But Farmington Hills City Manager William Costick said he hadn't heard about that.

Costick said all drains appeared to have worked properly. "The fact that it (water) dissipated so quickly indicates that the Rouge (River) was handling the water," he said.

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**CITY OF FARMINGTON
COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS
(Summary)**

A regular meeting of the Farmington City Council was called to order by Mayor Richardson at 8:00 p.m. on August 19, 1991, in Council Chambers, 25600 Liberty Street, Farmington, Michigan. Notice of the meeting was posted in compliance with Public Act 287-1971.

PRESENT: Hartstock, McShane, Richardson, Tupper, Yoder.

OTHERS PRESENT: City Manager Deadman, Director Lauhoff, Director Billing, Adm. Assistant Schultz, City Clerk Bushey.

Minutes of the previous meeting of August 5, 1991, were approved as written. Minutes of other Boards were received and/or filed.

Council denied the requested sign variance for the Maple Drug Stores.

Council instructed that a proposed ordinance amendment be drafted relative to window signs.

Council granted the requested fence variance for 3711 Grand River.

Council granted permission to the Tall Pines Subdivision to use the Tall Pine Drive/Drake Road right-of-way for a subdivision identification sign.

Council granted encroachment of right-of-way in front of city property on Grand River to allow the First Church of Christ Scientist to widen the driveway approach.

Council granted the request of Farmington Public Schools to use Shawnae Park this fall for soccer and football practice.

Council designated the City's voting delegate and alternate for the Michigan Municipal League annual meeting of October 3, 1991, were approved as written. Council authorized that the ballot be cast for the proposed nominees on the Worker's Compensation Fund Board of Trustees.

Council received and filed Birmingham's resolution relative to the Community Development Block Grant Program structure.

Council issued a proclamation designating the week of September 17-23, 1991 as **CONSTITUTION WEEK**.

Council adopted the following resolutions authorizing payments on the Sewer Improvement Project:

- \$196,084.34 to Posen Construction, Inc., Contract No. 1;
- \$387,556.58 to Dan's Excavating, Inc., Contract No. 2;
- \$13,830.84 to Black and Veatch.

Council received and filed the notice for transfer of SDN License at Orchard 10, Inc.

Council adopted a resolution establishing ballot language for the bond proposal for the 47th District Court expansion/restoration.

Council introduced and adopted the following ordinance amending the Recycling Ordinance:

**CITY OF FARMINGTON
ORDINANCE NO. C-589-91**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 16, RECYCLING, COMPOSTING AND SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL, OF THE FARMINGTON CITY CODE TO PROVIDE FOR THE WAIVER OF RECYCLING FEES FOR CERTAIN INDIVIDUALS AND TO EXEMPT CERTAIN INDIVIDUALS FROM THE MANDATORY RECYCLING PROVISIONS OF THE CHAPTER.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS

Section 1.
Chapter 16, Recycling, Composting and Solid Waste Disposal, of the Farmington City Code is hereby amended to add Sections 16-7.5 and 16-14.5 to read as follows:

Section 16-7.5 Exemption From Mandatory Separation of Recyclable Materials
The following individuals shall be exempt from the mandatory recycling provisions and requirements of this Chapter:

1. Individuals who are living alone and who have been determined by a physician licensed in the State of Michigan to be permanently physically disabled to such an extent to prevent the individual from complying with the mandatory recycling provisions and requirements of this Chapter.
2. Individuals who are living alone and who have been determined by a physician licensed in the State of Michigan to be temporarily physically disabled to such an extent to prevent the individual from complying with the mandatory recycling provisions and requirements of this Chapter.
3. Individuals who are living alone and who have been determined by a physician licensed in the State of Michigan to be temporarily physically disabled to such an extent to prevent the individual from complying with the mandatory recycling provisions and requirements of this Chapter.

Section 16-14.5 Waiver of Recycling Fees
Except as otherwise provided in this Chapter, the following individuals if subject to the mandatory recycling provisions of this Chapter shall comply with said mandatory recycling provisions, but shall be eligible to receive a waiver of recycling fees:

1. An individual that has an annual gross household income of less than or equal to Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars and who timely files with the City Clerk an Application For Waiver or Recycling Fee along with proof of annual gross household income from the previous year shall receive a waiver of all of the recycling fees required by this Chapter for the year for which the Application For Waiver of Recycling Fee was filed.
2. An individual that has an annual gross household income of more than Eight Thousand (\$8,000.00) Dollars but less than or equal to Thirteen Thousand Five Hundred (\$13,500.00) Dollars and who timely files with the City Clerk an Application For Waiver of Recycling Fee along with proof of annual gross household income for the previous year shall receive a waiver of one-half (1/2) of all of the recycling fees required by the Chapter for the year for which the Application For Waiver of Recycling Fee was filed.

Section 2. Repealer
All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. Severability
Should any section, subdivision, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof, other than the part so invalidated.

Section 4. Savings
All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired or incurred at the time this Ordinance takes effect are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force when they are commenced.

Section 5. Emergency Ordinance
This Ordinance is declared to be an emergency Ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety.

Section 6. Adoption
This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the affirmative vote of the minimum number of members required to enact an emergency Ordinance at a meeting thereof duly called and held on the 19th day of August, 1991; and such Ordinance shall be published by posting copies thereof in conspicuous locations in three places in the City, and the Clerk shall immediately after such posting, enter in the Ordinance book under the record of the Ordinance, a certificate under her hand stating the time and place of such publication by posting. This Ordinance shall also be published in accordance with Section 7.4 of the City Charter.
