AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 16, RECYCLING, COMPOSTING AND SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL, OF THE FARMINGTON CITY CODE TO PROVIDE FOR THE WAIVER OF RECYCLING FEES FOR CERTAIN INDIVIDUALS AND TO EXEMPT CERTAIN INDIVIDUALS FROM THE MANDATORY RECYCLING PROVISIONS OF THE CHAPTER.

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

Section 1.

Chapter 16, Recycling, Composting and Solid Waste Disposal, of the Farming-ton City Code is hereby amended to add Sections 16-7.5 and 16-14.5 to read as follows:

Section 2. Repealer
All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. Severability
Should any section, subdivision, clause or phrase of this Ordinance be declared
by the courts to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof, other than the part so invalidated.

Section 4. Savings
All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired or
incurred at the time this Ordinance takes effect are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force when they are commenced.

Section 5. Emergency Ordinance
This Ordinance is declared to be an emergency Ordinance which is immediately necessary for the preservation of the public peace, health and safety.
