Cranbrook marks theater's facelift

Cranbrook Educational Community will officially rededicate its renovated outdoor Greek Theatre with two performances of "The Cranbrook Masque" at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday, Sept. 13 and 14.

The Masque is a stylized play with a format that was popular between 1910 and 1930. Masques featured large casts, elaborate staging and are based on classic themes of love and poetry.

"The Cranbrook Masque" is a

four-act performance set in ancient Greece, Elizabethan England and Renaissance Italy.

The characters are Pan, his assistant, Fool's Gold and Pan's "Beloved." It centers on their conflict with the character Caliban who attempts to keep them apart. The show was written by Sidney Coe Howard, who also wrote the screenplay for "Gone With the Wind."

THE ORIGINAL 1916 perform-

ance featured about 130 actors and 200 costume changes.

The upcoming performances will benefit the Greek Theatre, which was built in 1915 by George and Ellen Booth.

The theater was designed by Detroit architect Marcus Burrows and features an amphitheater, stage and platforms on each side of the stage in front of a large swimming pool.

It was designed along classic Greek architectural lines and was

patterned after an ancient theater in Sicily. Over the years, however, Michigan's weather took a heavy toll on the theater and in the mid-1980s it had deteriorated to the point it was taken off the Cranbrook Gardens tour.

Original drawings were used in refurbishing the theater. The extensive renovations included replacing the terrace and pillars around the pool. For tickets, call Katie Kelly at 645-3064.

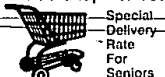
