Police-hired experts examined the

Police-hired experts examined the car, a classic 1960 Ford Thunder-hird, and re-enacted the accident three times on Franklin Road Tuesday.

"We were able to stop the car all three times," said Franklin Police Chief Edward Glomb after the test drive. "There is excessive play in the brakes, but the car did stop three times."

THE THUNDERBIRD was driven by Amy Selik, 20, of Bioomfield Hills. It belongs to her mother and stepfather who also own two other classic Thunderbirds, including 1955 and 1956 models, which also were in

and 1956 models, which also were in the parade.

Although the official police report wasn't complete, Giomb-said he didn't anticipate any criminal charges against Sellk.

Giomb noted that the brakes weren't adjusted properly on the nearly two-ton car.

"It was a combination of the driver not being familiar with the car and too much play in the brake pedal and the driver panicking a little bit," Glomb said.


"MY DAUGHTER has an excellent driving record," Must said.
