Buyers beware

Fire department urges consumers to make sure safety products work

"If you've purchased any fire pro-tection products — particularly those sold door-door — the Farm-ington Hills Fire Department wants you to call to be sure that the Items you've purchased work: as ad-vertised.

Fire officials have received some cails from residents who purchased products such as smoke detectors, hajon fire estingulahers and flame retardant solutions from a company named Safety Plus Inc.

In mid-August, state Attorney Géneral Frank Kelley ordered the company, based in Lexington, Ky. as sep selling its products. The week before the Federal Trade Commission won a temporary restraining order against the company, required that the irm stop allegedly deceptive employment practices. Garr also is concerned about residents who may have bought a flame retardant apary. Sales people reportedly have sold the product on the basis that it can prevent fire. For example, buyers have been told they could spray the retardant from their bed to the front door of their house so they could safely get out in case of fire, Garr said.

The Farmington Hills Fire Department does not endorse products. And Garr cautions residents: "If it (the product) sounds too good to be true, there's probably something wrong with it."

Another example Garr gave was of residents who have bought escape ladders from the door-lo-door sales people for \$95. A good escape ladder can be purchased at a hardware

store for \$35, he said.

GARR SAID he's received a "handful of complaints. But I'm concerned it's just the lip of the feeberg. People seem to be more vulnerable (to asles-people) when they are in their homes," be said.

Residents and potential buyers should be sure to check that any fire hours in the said of the said

residents and potential toyers should be sure to check that any fire safety products they buy bear the fire the one from Factory Mutual. That means the products have been tested and have passed standards required by the laboratories.

Garr auggests that anyone who have purchased fire safety products from door-to-door sales people or from anyone else and want they checked to be sure they work and are appriate should call the fire department fire prevention section at 553-0744.

"We certainly will respond," and said.
