HARRISON'S ROY Granger made his first start at tallback and re-sponded with 195 yards and four touchdowns on 28 carries.

The 5-foot-8, 155-pound senior secred on runs of 5, 2 and 64 yards in

"When you're playing Rice, you never know if you can move the ball or not." Herrington said. "But four on we of confidence."


