## Mercy sinks Captains; Hopkins paces Hawks

Farmington Hills Mercy and Plymouth Canton took separate routes to the final of the 11th Annual Mercy Hoops Tournament.  
In semifinal games Thursday, Canton knocked the championship round with an easy 59-29 victory over Muskegon. Mercy won the best of three games 34-29, 34-29, 34-29.  
Laura DeMatia scored a game-high 23 points for Mercy, and point guard Kathleen Berrigan made a number of big plays, including the go-ahead basket with 1:54 remaining.  
After the Captains scored six straight points to tie at 49, Berrigan drove to the top of the circle following a timeout and dropped in an outside shot. She also added the clinching free throws with :05 on the clock.  
"That was a big shot and a surprising shot for me," Mercy coach Larry Baker said. "I spent last season begging Kathleen to pull up and take that shot."  
"It was as if the arena was flowing and she was the 1990 Mercy Hoops MVP returning to defend her crown."

Berrigan played a fine floor game, getting the Marlins into their offense despite constant pressure from the Kettering defense.  
"I thought it was Kathleen's best game of the season, and it wasn't easy finding it," Baker said. "They defended her relentlessly. Laurie Wilson is one of the very best defensive players in the state, and she was lighting Kathleen came up with as many big plays."  
A Berrigan-to-DeMatia pass led to a layup and Mercy's first lead of the game at 2:37 in the third quarter, 33-31. After another DeMatia basket, Berrigan drove a layup and led to an uncontested layup and a 36-31 lead.  
The Marlins led 38-37 after three quarters and went on an 11-4 run to start the fourth period, building a 49-43 lead on Dena Wade's rebound shot.

the Marlins, who struggled early and were down 15-4 after one quarter. They outscored Kettering 9-4 to end the half and, capitalizing on 11 turnovers, closed to 23-20 at halftime.  
"Our strategy was to switch defenses every few minutes and let them solve it," Baker said. "When they did, we switched to something else, and that was how we came up with some of our relatively easy steals."  
"Kettering was so quick we didn't get a second chance unless it was a rebound. Thank God for rebounds. Dena and Marshall (Brooks) pitched in and helped out with that."  
As did her team, DeMatia had difficulty getting on track early as the Captains did well defending her and lobbing the ball inside on offense. But the 6-foot senior's game got better as the game progressed.  
"Mona Shores coach Mike Mack said 'She's the most fluid, agile and skilled post player in the state, but she is absolutely relentless and keeps playing hard,'" Baker said. "With her guts, she played herself into the game."

Berrigan added 15 points for Kettering (3-2), Laura Rieta 10 and Stacy Marvin eight.  
HARRISON 47, CLARENCEVILLE 19: Junior center Heather Hopkins played sparingly but did enough damage Thursday, leading host Farmington Hills Harrison to the non-league win over Livonia Clarenceville.  
Harrison is 3-2 overall, Clarenceville 1-2.  
Hopkins tallied 18 first-quarter points as the Hawks roared to a 23-3 advantage. She finished with 18 after going down in the second quarter with a sprained ankle and not returning.  
"We fronted her and backed her, but she's tough," Clarenceville coach Bob Wolf said. "She's a big difference. She moves well, posts up well and shoots well."
