## DNR recommends incinerator; ballot issue on

Despite an impassioned plea to abandon plans for the planned Auburn Hills Incinerator, Oakland County commissioners last week decided to go ahead with the all-or-nothing vote on the county solid waste program.

Thursday was the deadline for finalizing ballot language for the Nov. 5 proposal — and, presumably, the last chance for commissioners to offer voters a choice.

Over the objections of those opposed to the incinerator, commis-

sioners decided the ballot proposal will ask voters to approve a bonding issue for a solid waste plan that includes recycling, an additional land fill and the Auburn Hills facility.

Diane Pederson of Rochester Hills was one of about 15 incineration opponents who attended the meeting. During the public comment portion of the meeting, she presented a petition, reportedly containing 6,000 signatures, urging commissioners to change the ballot wording.

Sue Pearce of West Bloomfield explained her sentiments like this, "I am for mandatory recycling and curbside pick-up. But I will vote

against the incinerator."

DIANE BRIGHT of Troy, urged commissioners to split the ballot, offering voters a choice between a solid waste plan with the controversial incinerator, and another plan without it. "Let the voters decide which plan they want," she said.

Bright and other opponents say the incinerator — despite state-of-the-art technology — will emit heavy metals and gases that will cause health problems such as cancer.

Proponents of the incinerator claim it is the keystone of the county's \$500 million solid waste program. It will have a 2,000 ton per day capacity and would generate up to 40,000 kilowatts of electricity to be sold to the Detroit Edison Co.

They claim the incinerator will have the most sophisticated pollution control equipment and will not

cause health or environmental problems.

Although the county will not have an operating permit for the incinerator as commissioners had hoped, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources last week said it would recommend approval — an important step necessary for the Michigan Air Pollution Control Commission to issue the operating permit.

ROY REWOLD, chairman of the county board and a leading advocate of an incinerator, said the DNR announcement is "good news" because it removes some doubt about the incinerator's emissions.

Rewold, a Republican from Oakland Township, previously said that if voters reject the Nov. 5 ballot, county officials should discontinue efforts to formulate a solid waste program, leaving the issue to local communities.

## Realtor takes Lanni's road commission seat

Rudy Lozano of Clarkston has been named the new member of the Road Commission for Oakland County.

Lozano, a Realtor and highly successful fund-raiser for the Republican Party, was appointed Thursday during a partisan vote of the Oakland County Board of Commissioners.

Nineteen Republicans voted for Lozano and seven Democrats voted for Martin W. Hollander, an accountant from West Bloomfield.

Commissioner John G. Pappageorge, chairman of the Republican caucus, said he is happy with what he considered to be the "very thorough" process commissioners used to solicit candidates and eventually narrow the field to one.

Lozano was one of four finalists selected from a list of 16 candidates. Other finalists were Mark Chester, a former county commissioner from Troy, Michael McCulloch of Royal Oak, another former commissioner, and Roger D. Young of Bloomfield Hills, a former member of the Michigan State Transportation Commission.

candidates," said Pappageorge. R. Troy.

As part of the selection process, commissioners required the finalists to list property holdings and to submit to a background and credit check by the sheriff's department.

"I'm told this was the most exhaustive selection system the county has ever used in selecting a road commissioner," said Pappageorge. "I'm very happy with the results."

Lozano will fill the vacancy created in late July when James E. Lanni of Royal Oak resigned after pleading no contest to charges that he twice raped a 15-year-old babysitter. He is scheduled to be sentenced Sept. 24.
